## **Good Housekeeping means:**

- » Having procedures in place to regularly clear away accumulated waste and spillages.
- » Monitoring the fill levels of storage receptacles and ensure containers are replaced as necessary so as to prevent overfilling, spillages and items being left in non-designated areas.
- » Regularly monitoring areas to clear away temporary obstructions as soon as practicable.
- » When work is finished, put overalls and other PPE away in lockers or other safe places. Do not leave belongings lying around.
- » If you see anything lying on floors, stairways or passages that could cause people to trip and fall, pick it up and put it in a safe place Don't wait for someone else to move it.
- » If you notice rubbish piling up which you cannot remove, bring this to the attention of your supervisor.
- » Good housekeeping is everybody's business on site, it is an ongoing activity and a once-a-week clean-up is not enough.
- » Access ways are escape routes. A safe place of work at all times includes a safe means of access and egress to all places where work is done. Do not leave materials or equipment in areas where they might impede someone's escape or cause a tripping hazard.
